B. 'Erythrophylla Bunchii'

B. 'Beefsteak' or B. erythrophylla is a vigorous creeping rhizomatous plant with medium, dark, olive-green, rounded leaves, with red undersides and light pink flowers usually in winter to early spring. It is developed from a cross between B. manicata and B. hydrocotylifolia. This cross was made in 1845 in Germany, when Begonia hydrocotylifolia was apparently introduced into Berlin Botanical Garden from Mexico in the 1840's. It was named for its resemblance to pennywort, a marshland plant of Europe and North Africa. It is also likened to a miniature waterlily.

When Karl Fotsch reported of *B. erythrophylla*, the beefsteak begonia, he told of a Danish artist who had painted a picture of Paradise in 1920 using the plant. The florist remarked that the begonia was from the new world. This enabled the artist to make this observation, "The florist did not know where Paradise was situated or whether it was not possible that the plants of all continents might grow there!"

- B. hydrocotylifolia grows on damp, steep rocks in rain forests in Veracruz, Mexico. Pale and dark leaved variants exist.
- B. 'Erythrophylla Helix' has leaves that are spiraled into corkscrews; its flowers are light pink, winter to spring. It is called the "Whirlpool Begonia."

### MINUTES OF JULY 28, 2013

MINUTES: The minutes of June were approved as published.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Lynn Sissney reported that the share account contained \$60.32, the checking account held \$1517.96, and the money market had a balance of \$2564.09. She asked to move \$1000 into the checking account, but Doug presented a check for \$1297.47 to her from the proceeds of the successful Southwest Region/American Begonia Society Convention. Doug also reported that profits reached \$8678.00 and \$6487. went to the A.B.S. while \$864.98 remained with the Southwest Region. Since JJL (Debbie Perillo and Lee Coleman) will not be growing begonias for clubs, some of the money will have to be used to purchase begonia plugs for our branch to grow.

MOTION: Jim Estes made a motion to buy 350 plugs. Nelda Moore seconded the motion, which passed.

Zilker Garden Festival will be held March 29 and 30, 2014, and other begonias can be purchased along with any that the club grows for a total of at least 400 plants.

MOTION: Joan Estes made a motion for Doug to purchase extra begonias to continue to have at least three plants for a raffle during each meeting. The motion carried.

PROGRAM: Jackie Johnson presented a list of program topics for future meetings. Ken Fuchs will bring a power point DVD Convention Program to the next meeting. Nelda will provide the screen. Jim Estes issued a tiny aluminum can, a plastic soda water bottle, pieces of begonias, perlite, rooting gel, and water to begin his interesting program on propagation. Each member worked diligently to cut, to plant, and to prepare for the leaves and stems to produce plantlets.

HOSPITALITY: Vickey Cole will bring the paper products such as cups, plates, knives, forks, and spoons to the August 25 meeting.

ADJOURNMENT: Doug adjourned the meeting, and then the exciting program began. It ended at 3:45 P.M.
