BEGONIA 'PEARLII'

Although its origin is obscure, Begonia 'Pearlii' has a fine papillary surface, pointed heart-shaped leaves, and like B. *imperialis* types of begonias, it has a small narrow creeping rhizome that can be crowded with new leaves pushing out of the old axils. The pale green stipules with hairy keels guard the fuzzy pads of baby leaves, then turn to brown twists. The raised portions between the veins of the new leaves are diffused with red. Then it spreads to a flush on the back that is darker on the edges. When this shows on top as a brownish-green border, it looks like a rex. The first color is pewter-green, overlaid with a pinkish tint. The margins are ruffled and toothed showing little sprouts of hairs. The mature leaves become a jade green with the pearly pink light that gives the plant its name.

The first flowers are rather tall with pale green bracts around each flower. The male blooms are tiny, but none of the round, red-tinted buds open before they fall. The female blooms have twin petals at the tip of the ovary that look like pink polka dots.

RECIPES FROM MEMBERS:

Baked Beans from Nelda and Joe Moore

4 slices of bacon

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped onion

- **1**-pound cans pork and beans with tomato sauce
- 2 Tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 Tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon prepared mustard

Cook bacon till crisp; drain, reserving 2 tablespoons drippings. Crumble bacon. Cook onion in reserved drippings till tender, but not brown; add crumbled bacon to remaining ingredients, mixing well. Turn into 1 ½ quart bean pot or casserole. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees about one hour or less. Serves 6

APPLE ANNIE'S CURRIED ORZO/RICE SALAD

Dressing:

1 cup peanut oil or other tasteless oil

¹/₄ cup lemon juice

Two teaspoons salt

1 Tablespoon curry powder

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup white wine vinegar

1/2 cup sugar

1/2 teaspoon ground coriander

1/2 teaspoon turmeric

1/2 teaspoon black pepper

Pinch cayenne

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup parsley

Mix all ingredients together in mixing bowl. Set aside. Makes 2 cups of dressing.

Salad:

- 2 cups uncooked orzo or basmati rice (Jackie uses basmati rice in this recipe)
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup golden raisins
- ¹/₂ cup toasted almonds (Jackie uses blanched almonds)
- ³/₄ cup diced purple onion
- 2 cups diced green or red apple (do not peel)

Cook pasta or rice according to package instructions. While still warm, toss with dressing, mixing until pasta or rice is well coated (can just add dressing to pot of cooked rice and mix.) Add raisins, almonds, onions, and apple. If additional seasoning is desired, add more lemon juice or salt before serving. Makes about 2 quarts.

PROPAGATION IN REVIEW:

Root cuttings in baby food jars so that the hormones assist with forming roots. Roots should be at least one-half inch long before planting in a small pot.

Root cuttings in perlite and vermiculite or peat moss or a combination of these. Use distilled or sterile water for moisture.

Rhizomatous, rexes, and tuberous begonias start from leaf cuttings with the exception of B. *luxurians* and some small mallet type canes. The leaf cuttings need a sterile moist medium in a covered container.

Over potting new plants will rapidly kill them. Use a 2 to 3 inch pot and re-pot in about 6 weeks or more.
