Dear District V Garden Club Members,

Spotlight on Ways and Means Chairmen Sylvía Mertínk and Sandra Miller




Sisters and best friends, Sylvia and Sandra

Crown Bees is a mason bee pollination and education company and National Garden Clubs, Inc. is the larges worldwide nonprofit organization of volunteers pursuing gardening's best practices and education for a sustainable environment.

President Nelson says that, "The hallmark of National Garden Club activities is to protect and conserve our natural resources, and to promote education so we may all be better caretakers of our beautiful planet." She also says that,




"Increasing bee awareness and promoting the use of bee safe products allow us to be part of this powerful solution".

Debbie Skow (Native Bee/Bee GAP Chairman for NGC) stated that she will be working to collaborate with Crown Bees to implement 1) A NGC Bee Speakers Bureau to increase bee awareness and practices, 2) encourage bee products in annual plant sales by individual garden clubs, 3) develop a bee

education program for our youth programs and 4) to implement the BeeGAP (Gardeners Adding Pollinators) program where members raise mason bees to pollinate gardens. Crown Bees purchase excess bees to send to commercial farmers to supplement honey bee pollinators.

Dave Hunter, founder of Crown Bees, said, "This is a groundbreaking alliance to reach communities everywhere with an easy backyard garden solution to the declining honey bee population. Nearly 1/3 of our food supply is threatened by lack of pollination. We need more alternate bee pollinators to keep food on tomorrow's table. Bees flourish in an edible landscape and that is a great solution in which we all benefit."

SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION DISTRICT V, TEXAS GARDEN CLUBS, INC.

SCHOLARSHIP BOARD: District V Scholarship Chairman, the Scholarship Committee, which consists of one member from each of the three Zones, and the District Director.

PURPOSE OF GRANT: To encourage study and continued practice of Horticulture, Floriculture, Landscape Design, Conservation, Forestry, Botany, Land and Water Management, and acceptable allied subjects.

Application may be made only through the District V Scholarship Chairman.

QULIFICATIONS: Applicants must be Texas residents and living in District V; a rising college Freshman or Sophomore; scholastic record of at least 3.0(B average or better); definite plans to continue in the discipline in which the scholarship is granted.

JUDGING: The following criteria shall be paramount:

- 1. Academic record
- 2. Character
- 3. Aptitude
- 4. Evidence of interest in field chosen
- 5. Financial need

Ability shall be the first consideration

RE: APPLICATION: Applicants, including previous winners, may apply for any semester of his freshman and/or sophomore year's study provided that all requirements are met and current recommendations are attached. One student could receive a maximum of four semesters' scholarship aid for his freshman and sophomore studies.

In the last newsletter issue, I told you I was going to try my hand at lasagna gardening. I know there are many of you out there that have tried this type of gardening with great success and know what I am talking about and many of you who are going, "what is lasagna gardening?" When I first heard of this type of gardening it was from a master gardening program given to my garden club. At first I thought it might be raising plants that you would use in making Italian foods, such as lasagna. But, no, it is a whole new way of gardening.

Since I wanted to extend my herb garden, I decided I would try this with a fall vegetable garden and then in the spring replant it with herbs. I started by laying out

my bed with string. You can use different kinds of things such as chalk, garden hose or spray paint to mark the outline of your bed. Make sure all the rocks and debris are removed. Then, I weed eated all the grass down as far as I could. I have a friend who did a bed and she did not even do that. But I wanted it to be nice and flat. Once that was done then I started layering, just like making lasagna, hence the name.

Take cardboard of any kind; old boxes, Coke cartons, anything that can be laid flat. If you have a recycle center, there is always a good supply of cardboard. If not, the local grocery store usually has plenty of boxes they are going to throw away. Be sure when you are placing these that you overlap. You do not want any grass or weeds growing up between the layers. This step may take a little more time but it will be worth it in the long run. Next, make your newspaper layers. You can do this several different ways. I take my newspaper layers and soak them in a garden cart filled with water. Others have told me that they spread the newspapers and then watered them thoroughly. I think the soaking method works really well, especially if the wind is blowing. That way your paper doesn't end up all over the yard. After you have several layers of newspaper, then spread compost over it all. This can be compost that you have made or the stuff you get in bags, you can even throw your compost right into the garden. Make a nice thick layer of this and water it down also so it will not blow away. I lined my garden with stones to keep the paper down and it looks neater, but that is only a personal thing. Although still hot the garden had some shade and I have easy access to water, so far so good. Later in the fall I will start replacing the vegetables with herbs and then finish with several other plants in the spring. This is a great way to recycle as it seems I always have newspapers and cardboard.

Patricia Lanza, the person who first wrote about this amazing new gardening idea, won a Quill & Trowel award from the Garden Writers Association of America for her book, "Lasagna Gardening." This book gives you all the information about her experiment. She also wrote "Lasagna Gardening for Herbs" and "Lasagna Gardening for Small Spaces." These books give you step-by-step guide to the wonderful world of lasagna gardening and can be purchase on line or in most bookstores.

So, that is what is happening on the hill right now. With fall in the air, I am in the planting mood and this is the perfect time to put in perennial herbs and other plants. With the cool weather, the plants have a good chance to get established before cold weather arrives. I am looking forward to establishing a herbal butterfly and hummingbird garden. There is nothing more amazing than to have a mass of migrating monarchs in your yard during the fall. Until next time, Happy Gardening from Iris Hill.

Planning to Enter a Scrapbook for 2013-2014?

Now is the time to start thinking and preparing a club scrapbook for next year's awards consideration. In the perfect world the scrapbook chairman would gather all the items from the preceding month and sit down and assemble the pertinent pages while everything is fresh, thus not being rushed in the summer and trying to remember details of the event. I would love to be this person, but I am not. Although I suggest you to do it month by month, you of course find your own process.

A club scrapbook is the perfect way to record your club's history from year to year. There are some problems as you may have encountered, as to how and where to store the past volumes. Some clubs give the scrapbook to the outgoing president. I personally think the storage problem can be reduced by condensing the "competitive" scrapbook to a two year volume by selectively keeping only those pages that reflect the club year and membership of a historical nature. Whatever you do with your scrapbooks, no one can deny that to reflect back on past achievements through this media is wonderful.

The best way to begin preparing a scrapbook for competition is **purchase the Scrapbook Brochure** from our Fort Worth Headquarters. The book has some wonderful suggestions for how to form a functioning committee to get the job done with the minimum of headaches. Also it has some super tips on how to organize the monthly materials to make the assembly easier. Like all TGC brochures, it leads you through the process explaining the requirements as to required page sequence and great tips on journaling and picture placement. Just being a scrapbook enthusiast does not make a winning garden club scrapbook because there are a great many rules. Buy the book and make life easier for yourself and increase the chances of a winning entry.

District V has always been very heavy into scrapbook competition at the state level, but I warn you that the brochure is the key to a winning entry. Good Luck!



A&M Garden Club Participates in College Station's 75th Anniversary Celebration At the George Bush Presidential Library

A&M Garden Club formed in 1936 and was federated in 1937. It was originally formed by the wives of Texas A&M (College at that time) and was thus called A&M Garden Club. College Station was a community but not incorporated until 1938. The club has contributed to many College Station civic projects including cemetery plantings of trees and roses, the Keep Brazos Beautiful Flower Show, and is currently working on the restoration and beautification of the Richard Carter Park, the city's only historical park. The club has won Garden Club of the Year twice in the past 5 years, most recently in 2013. This year, College Station is celebrating its 75th birthday, and A&M Garden Club was asked to assist in the exhibit which will be at the George Bush Presidential Library in College Station from October 21 through January 4.

For the museum exhibit, floral arrangements were requested to accompany furniture pieces contributed by Linda Harvell, owner of Texas Trading Post, and longtime College Station resident. The pieces were Victorian and turn of the century. Floral arrangements at that time were traditionally arranged in mass design. Due to the nature of the exhibit, only dried or artificial material could be used. Although NGC designs for competition do not permit artificial material, some silk chrysanthemums and greenery were required to complete the designs and provide color.
