Our guest speaker will be Al Elliott



from Georgetown. His presentation is titled *Our Infatuation With Iris*: Why we are infatuated with the Iris and how society, you

and me have expressed this via the arts, stamps, poetry, iris silent auctions, ceramics, photography, etc.

Al says he got addicted to the love of iris after joining the Santa Fe Iris Society in 1993 to become a life member of the American Iris Society, Median Iris Society and a member of the Tall Bearded Iris Society and Historical Iris Society. He is currently a member of the Iris Society of Austin and he is in his second term as the secretary for the TBIS. He served as president of the Santa Fe Iris Society, Show chair numerous times, chaired the Region 23 Conventions, Assistant Regional VP for Region 23 (New Mexico) and the West Texas Iris Society Exhibition chair/co-chair. He began judges training in 2002 and had the honor to judge shows in NM, AZ, CO,NE, and TX. He is currently on the AIS Judges Handbook Rewrite Committee to rewrite the English Box and Education Display Sections. He has presented programs and judges training to iris clubs in NM, TX, and CA on subjects such as English boxes, De-Mything the R&I, Dykes, and "English Box" training at the 2014 AIS Convention in Dallas, and "Other Than Tall Bearded or Not Eligible for The Best Specimen Show (Collections,

Seedlings, Bulbous Iris and Education Displays" at the 2014 Region 17 Convention. He served out a term



on the AIS Board of Directors.

Al and his wife Barbara, grew 600+ irises in 2010-2013 while living in West Texas. They have had to downsize to 100 irises after moving to a 55+ retirement community. ### President's Message by Glenn Huddleston

As we begin a new year, it is not unusual for iris lovers to become complacent and ignore their iris plantings. While irises are forgiving when it comes to lapses in cultural practices, if you are anticipating a beautiful display of blooms in the spring, key management techniques need to start now.

It may be wintertime, however winter weeds and grasses can quickly take over a garden site. These problem plants rob irises of available moisture and nutrients. Mechanical control will be your best control

now since most herbicides do not perform as needed with low temperatures. Also as we clean the garden, we need to take care to remove dead iris leaves, fallen tree leaves, and any other debris which could provide an over- wintering site for in-

sects and disease spores.

Hopefully you remembered to fertilize your irises in the Fall. Irises will need additional

nutrients about thirty days before bloom. The date of February 14 (give or take) is recognized as a good target date. Try to fertilize your irises just ahead of a good slow rain.

If fire ants are present in your landscape it will only be a matter of time before they have mounds in your iris plantings. They enjoy using iris

clumps to support their mounds. Fire ants should be treated as soon as found to avoid

problems for yourself and your guests at bloom time. A light mound dusting with Acephate (*Orthene*) has proven effective.

Take time now to ensure that all iris varieties are properly labeled. If plants are labeled it will make checking for variety correctness much easier at bloom time.




The weather people continue to remind us that we are 12 to 14

inches below normal rainfall. Every location is different so check newly planted rhizomes to insure they have adequate moisture for root growth and fan development.

Last, but not least, be prepared to cope with disease and insect problems prior to and during the bloom season. Looking for-

ward for a great Iris Show on April 11.
