It's Show Time!

Our Iris Show is only a few days away. Blooms are showing up all over our area and it looks like we should have plenty for our show. Please note the new location for this year's show. It is the Holiday Inn & Suites, 1801 Development Blvd., on the north side of Waco. This will be Exit 339 (Loop 340/Lake Shore Dr.) off of I-35. You want to be on the east side access road, heading north. Turn right between, Discount Tire and Home Depot, and continue east to the Hotel. We are very excited about this beautiful new venue for our show.

We still have a few openings in our Artistic Design section. The show theme is *A Calendar of Irises*. The classes are:

Class 1: Winter Turns to Spring

Class 2: The Colors of Spring

Class 3: Summer

Class 4: The Holiday Season

If you would like to enter any of these classes, please let show chair Ken Anderson know so we can save you a spot. We are hoping to have all the months of the year covered so we can make a WIS calendar for next year.

All entries should arrive between 8 and 10 a.m. The show will open for public viewing at 1:00 and all exhibits are to be removed at 4:00.

In conjunction with our Iris Show, we will host an Iris Sale. This will be set up in the hall outside the exhibit hall and will be open from

10:00 until 4:00 or sold out. Most of the iris will be potted and ready to plant in the garden. Members who are planning to bring irises for the sale should call or e-mail Peggy with a list so photos will be available for all sale plants.

The Gardener's Gathering in Woodway at the Carleen Bright Arboretum will be held Sunday, April 12, beginning at 1:00. Waco Iris Society will have a booth selling more irises in pots ready for planting. In case of rain, the vendors will all be moved into the beautiful new Pavillion, so the sale will go on, rain or shine.

President's Messageby Glenn Huddleston

I'm pleased to report that at G&G Gardens our expectations are high for an outstanding bloom season. We have had ample moisture and the day and night time temperatures are increasing. Stalk development has been noted in many gardens in late March.

As we enter the 2015 bloom season I would like to remind everyone, there are several things everyone needs to do to make your iris growing more enjoyable.

Record keeping is an important part of a successful iris planting. Not only do you need to keep records, you need to write it down when it happens. We all get caught up in the excitement of incredibly beautiful blooms and tell ourselves we will write it down later. I've been there and it doesn't work. To begin with everyone needs planting diagrams that illustrates where varieties are planted. If you keep your planting diagrams on a computer, I would advise a hard copy as well.

Next, be prepared to check the variety when it blooms to insure it is correct. It may be the most beautiful iris you have ever seen, however if it's not the right variety according to your planting diagram, you need to record the variety, as planted, is wrong.

As club members we share our irises with others and sell irises at club sales. It is imperative that we keep the varieties true as named to maintain a good reputation for our club sales.

Another reason for being sure your varieties are correct come front and center at division time. A lot of work goes into the division process and we need to get it right. I would suggest digging only one clump at a time and write the variety name on several leaves before digging the next clump. Otherwise,

at the end of the day, all you will have is landscape irises, with no names!

back when her aunt was a member and we are glad to have her back.


