President's Message

Hopefully by the time you read this article you will have fertilized your irises. A mid-to-late October fertilization is important for root development and the initiation and growth of new increases. Irises were in a stress mode most of the year and will need help to recover. In many cases the losses were so great that the bed will need to be replanted.

If you renovated beds and replanted rhizomes just remember the rhizomes will need moisture to establish a functioning root system that is capable of supporting top growth.

We all know that grass and weeds can take over a planting quickly and rob the rhizomes of vital nutrients. For new plantings I encourage the use of a pre-emergent herbicide such as PREEN. Now, here is where it gets tricky. These materials must be applied BEFORE the weed and grass seeds germinate. If seeds have sprouted, these materials will not work. It goes without saying these pre-emergent products must be applied to clean beds. Furthermore these products are not effective on any plant that comes up from a root, such as Bermuda grass and day flowers. Also, to make this decision more challenging, is the fact that micro-climates vary from garden to garden. This simply means we cannot all put the material out on the Well, I have danced same day. around the question long enough.

Fall rains will lead to the germination of weed and grass seeds. Therefore, I feel the dates of October 31 to November 15 are a safe bet. If it doesn't rain, these dates can be backed up. Always follow the directions on the label when applying these products. They are expensive and should not be wasted.

In an exciting start to the new club year, members of the Waco Iris Society converged on the West Waco Library on a sunny September Saturday morning with rhizomes in hand. Eighteen members attended the annual Giveaway, Exchange and Auction meeting on September 19, including several of our newest members who were recognized at the start of the meeting by club Glenn President, Huddleston. Minutes were read by Secretary, Bill Calhoon, and Mitchell Whitley presented the Treasurer's Report, followed by the AIS Membership Drawing which was won by Jean Richardson. Glenn then took the opportunity to recognize Mitch-



ell on his accomplishment of being a member in good standing of the American Iris Society for 43 years. Con-

As part of an update on the August meeting of Region 17 of the American Iris Society held in Dallas, Peggy Cathey, who serves as Membership Chair for Region 17, alerted members that the annual membership dues for AIS would increase on October 1st and offered to work with those who wanted to renew before the increase went into effect. Peggy, who also was nominated as RVP of Region 17 for the upcoming term of 2016-2019, asked the Waco club members if they would consider hosting the 2016 Region 17 Meeting. Following discussion of possible venues, costs and opportunities, motions were introduced for WIS to host the Region 17 Annual Meeting in 2016 and for Peggy to be authorized to work with the Hampton Inn as the host hotel, both of which carried unanimously.

In more ongoing business, the club voted to hold the 2016 Iris Show and Sale at the Holiday Inn Express.

Following a break for refreshments, the fun started with the annual rhizome exchange. Members were encouraged to bring an increase from irises received as part of the 2013 giveaway, or a comparable variety, for the exchange which is yet another opportunity for members to obtain recent introductions for their

gardens. Thanks to the generosity of several members who brought more than one increase, all members present at the meeting received through rhizome the change. Next up was the giveaway. Members were able to choose one rhizome from an impressive selection of 100 rhizomes which had been ordered from Mid-America Gardens in Oregon and Superstition Iris Gardens in California. vendors sent good quality rhizomes, many with multiple increases, of varieties introduced as recently as 2015. All rhizomes were 2012 or newer introductions.

Those rhizomes remaining after the Giveaway were then auctioned with Glenn as auctioneer. Even with heated bidding on a number of rhizomes, members were able to acquire some great bargains, all while supporting the Club. In all, the auction added \$1,028 to the Club's coffers. Special thanks to those members who helped at the meeting as well as those who did all the work "behind the scenes" to make this year's Exchange, Giveaway and Auction such a success.

Entries in this category may include anything related to birds. Consider the wild birds seen in backyards, water fowl, birds of prey even those associated with the farm.

Category III, Wild and Wonderful

This category is very broad and can include any animal found in the woods, the desert, the mountains, or the jungle. Accessories

may include items that are related to or suggestive of the environment in which the animal is found in addition to using the animal itself.

Category IV, Creatures of the Sea

Exhibits in this category will use accessories related to fish, seahorses, shellfish, etc. Consider the use of shells and coral along with colors associated with sand and sea.

Please consider signing up for in one of more of the categories for the artistic division. I am anticipating some wonderful entries for the artistic division. I hope to see everyone at our next meeting and will try to answer any questions you have about the upcoming show in April.
