

What Is An English Box?

Our meeting this month and for the rest of the year will be at the Crestview Church of Christ Community Center, 7129 Delhi, in Waco. Meeting begins at 10:00 a.m. Saturday, March 19.

We are excited to have Al Elliott back again as our speaker. Al always brings something new and different. This month, he will be telling us all about how to make an English Box. English Boxes are a Section of the Horticulture Division of our Iris Show. I haven't seen one entered in Waco, so I am looking forward to seeing how it is done. Always check the Show Schedule for size and material to use when making your English Box. Also, you will want a theme for your Eng-

only the bloom, not the entire stalk, so if you have beautiful flowers, but not so perfect stalks, you can still show them off.

Al's bio: Al joined the Santa Fe Iris Society in 1993, is a life member of the American Iris Society and was elected to the AIS Board of Directors in 2016. He is a member of the Median Iris Society, Tall Bearded Iris Society and Historical Iris Society. Al served as president of the Santa Fe Iris Society, Show chair

numerous times and chaired the Region 23 Convention (Twice). He was the Assistant Regional VP for Region 23 (New Mexico) in 2009. He served as the West Texas Iris Society Exhibition chair/co-chair in 2012 and 2013. Al's judges training began in 2002 and he is an active garden/exhibition judge in NM, AZ, NE, CO, and TX.

His presentations/judges training classes include English Boxes, Dykes, Space Age Iris, Before Awarding the 1st Ribbon, Back to the Basics – Point Scoring, Not Eligible for Best Specimen of the Show – Collection, Seedlings, Bulbous Iris, Education Displays, AIS Awards, Our Infatuation with the Iris, De-Mything the AIS R&I Checklists and Iris Postage Stamps.

Al states, "We grew 600+ irises in 2010-2013 and have down sized to 100 irises due to moving to a 55+retirement community in Georgetown, TX." Al retired after 23 years as USAF Lt Col in 1991 and then served 17 years at Los Alamos National Laboratory in charge of the nuclear safety compliance program.

The English Box:

The presentation will focus on the following: There are four major ways to display or to show off your iris. 1) "In the Garden" shows the entire plant — roots, stem, stalk, clumping and the flower. 2) The iris

is used in floral designs in the background or as the primary focus. 3) We use the iris in our traditional "horticulture" shows to accent the stem and blooms. 4) The English box emphasizes the beauty of the

individual bloom. We can compare different colors, different hybridizers.

or the various types of beards, especially with the space age iris. The English box was initially introduced by the British Horticulture Society as a standard for showing individual flowers, minus stem and foliage. The box can be used for almost any floral bloom. It is made out of wood or Styrofoam material, either square,

oblong, or triangle shaped. You need a dark background [paint or cloth] to help accent the bloom and you need to display the bloom in florists picks, paper cups, or glass jars, as well as a supply of

water and support to hold the flower upright.

Be sure to see the Show Schedule for the rules for size and material needed to make an English Box. Each club has different rules.

At least four varieties of tall-bearded iris in my garden are already making bloom stalks. hope that all members will have some varieties to enter.
