Everyone is invited to participate in the iris exchange. Members who received a gift plant in the Giveaway in 2014 are asked to bring back 1 rhizome increase from either of the irises they received that year. You will be getting a letter with the names of the irises you received. If you did not get an iris that year, you may still participate by bringing an iris rhizome introduced in 2011 or later. Please write the name of the iris on a 2"x 8" slip of paper, plus write the name on the center leaf of the plant. The papers will go into a pot and you will draw for your exchange plant. Only those who bring a plant for the exchange are eligible to participate in the exchange.

ses and how they came to be. His Saturday evening program, titled *Median Classics*, had many photos



of several of the medal winning median irises including 3 Dykes Medal Median irises: **Brown** Lasso a Border Bearded which received the Dykes in 1981, the Intermediate Bearded iris Starwoman, DM 2008 and Di-

viding Line, a Miniature Tall Bearded iris which won the Dykes in 2014. There were also photos of irises, in Perry's opinion,

that should have won awards. Hooker Nichols has sev-

eral which have won medals and he also had the very first Space Age Median—*Hagar's Helmet*.

Perry has introduced 40 irises of all types and sizes. Four have won medals, 10 received the Award of Merit, and he has received 22 Honorable Mentions for his iris introductions.

Attendees of the Region 17 Meeting were well-fed by the breakfast in the hotel each morning, barbecue Friday night, the hospitality room offered sandwiches, dips, chips, cookies, and cakes, and the Italian food, salad, and 6 different desserts catered by the Olive Garden topped off the Saturday meals.

The centerpieces were original and beautiful. Bill Calhoon did a wonderful job taking money in the boutique. We had lots of new and older irises donated by members and purchased for the boutique from Superstition Iris Garden. The irises were sold, offered in a silent auction and put in a raffle. Also in the Silent Auction was a Texas Flag and certificate stating that it flew over the Capital building in Austin earlier in August that was donated by the Iris Society of Austin. Other raffle items included an iris hat box full of Texas made items donated by the Iris Society of Austin, a huge basket of goodies donated by the Lone Star Iris Society, a basket of Texas pecans and other goodies donated by the North Plains Iris Society and a basket of garden supplies donated by B.J. & Frank. There were all kinds of Iris items offered for sale in the boutique. Waco Iris Society did quite well with our boutique sales.

Each year, the hosting club receives \$400 from the Region to purchase irises for the main event-the Iris Auction. Proceeds from the auction go to the Region to offset the printing costs of the Region 17 Newsletters. This year, irises from Mid-America Garden, Rockytop Iris Garden, Stout Gardens at Dancingtree, Hillcrest Iris, and Seandel Iris Garden were offered. Glenn Huddleston did a great job as auctioneer with Dan Cathey and Jerry Keeth of JCI&DS assisting. The auction made \$1,966.

Greetings From Your Show Chair by Ken Anderson

Are you ready to be finished with the hot days of summer? Well, I am sure everyone is appreciating the fact that those extremely high temperatures of early August are behind us and we can begin to anticipate some cooler weather. With the arrival of September it is time to be doing a lot of work in the garden. Hopefully all of you who are able to do so have been out digging and dividing already. As ordinary a task as it is, and so repetitive, there is just something special about pulling that clump of rhizomes apart, inspecting the condition of the increase, and anticipating a beautiful bloom in the garden next spring. And speaking of next spring, a theme has been chosen for our show. The theme of the show for 2017 is Irises: A Celebration of Color. This theme was chosen to recognize and celebrate the entire spectrum of the rainbow as the range of colors found in irises has grown to include them all. It is my intention that participation in the design portion of the show should be fun. Hopefully by offering such a broad theme more people will be encouraged to participate in the competition. If you have never participated in the design competition, I hope you will consider doing so this year. Here is a description of the categories in the artistic division:

Category I, Flaming Red and Orange

Artistic displays for this category will incorporate the use of red and/ or orange in whatever manner suits the exhibitor. Try to use varieties of iris for the display that are either red or orange if possible, or consider using a red or an orange background. Also give some thoughts to accessories that are usually associated with one or both colors. Think of fire, desert, sunsets, fall leaves, various types of vegetables, fruits, or even man-made items associated with the color, such as fire trucks.

Category II, *Glittering Gold and* Yellow

2017 Iris Show (cont)

Artistic displays for this category will incorporate the use of gold and/ or yellow. It is suggested (not required) that the exhibitor try to use gold or yellow irises for this category. As in other categories, the background could be gold or yellow and the accessories could include items that one associates with the colors gold and yellow. Things to consider are the sun, sunlight, sunshine, various fruits, vegetables, other flowers, birds, etc. that are associated with this color. Also consider man-made things that are associated with these colors.

Category III, Anything Goes with Green

The exhibitor will use as much green as possible to contrast with the color of irises in the display. Preferably (but not required) the exhibitor would use a shade of green, or a blend of greens for the background. As the name of this category suggests, the use of green should accentuate the design and selection of flowers for the design.

Category IV, Brilliant Blue and Passionate Purple

Artistic displays in this section will have blue or purple as the primary color in the display. That can be achieved by using a blue or purple background (not required) or using flowers in a shade of purple or blue. Blues and purples suggest night clouds, sunny skies, stormy skies, night scenes, water, winter time, cold weather or beaches with blue oceans. Consider the use of other natural fruits or flowers with blue or purple.

Exhibitors should keep in mind that the focus of this total artistic display is to suggest all the colors of the rainbow. The goal is to conform to the rules of design but to have fun representing the color you choose in whatever way is pleasing to your eye. Don't forget that the container for the design is also a good way to add that extra bit of color.
