



Welcome to the somewhat cooler ?? Fall weather. It is still unseasonably warm but for some of us, you know who you are, it could be an opportunity to get out there and do that Fall fertilization that you kept meaning to do but couldn't seem to find time. Take a few minutes to clean the dead leaves off the plants and do a little policing to get rid of the other clutter that can harbor disease and insects. These two tasks will reward you in the Spring with healthier,



happier plants and bigger, better blooms. It is probably a little late for a pre-emergent application since that has to be done before the weed seeds germinate but if you haven't done so, it may still be worth the cost and effort because weed seeds seem to always be blowing in from somewhere. The weeds that are germinating now are the ones you will be fighting in the Spring, henbit, chickweed, rye grass, etc., so even if you only get partial control it is still a good thing. Please be sure to water the pre-emergent to activate it. It probably isn't likely, but if you see any bloom stalks on your newly planted iris rhizomes, do the plants and yourself a favor and cut the stalk off close to the rhizome. It takes a tremendous amount of plant energy to bloom and for this to occur while the plant is trying to establish itself could exhaust the plant and cause it to die. I know that you really want to see that bloom but wait till Spring. For established plants this is likely the rebloom you have been working for so please do not cut those off unless a freeze is expected and it is close to opening,. On the brighter side, we are finally starting to see some much needed moisture which will help carry your plants into the Winter cold much better.

Our Fall sale was a great success! The turnout, both in terms of club members and customers was absolutely great. We stayed busy from open till close with (cont. pg 2)

The Waco Iris Society held its first meeting of the club year on Saturday, September 17, 2016, at the Community Center of the Crestview Church of Christ. Twenty-three members attended the meeting which was our annual Giveaway, Exchange and Auction. After calling the meeting to order, WIS President Dan Cathey reminded members that dues for the 2016-2017 club year were payable. Dan then recognized all the hard work of WIS club members in hosting the AIS Region 17 Meeting held in August. Bill Calhoon then conducted Roll Call and read the May 2016 Meeting Minutes and Mitchell Whitley presented the Treasurer's Report.

WIS Show Chair Ken Anderson provided an update on the 2017 Iris Show which will be held on Saturday, April 8, 2017. The theme of this year's show will be, "Irises: A Celebration of Color." 

What Is A Rebloomer? By Betty Wilkerson (Zone 6)

If you hang around iris groups, either in the flesh-and-blood world of local societies and rhizome sales in your local neighborhoods, or in the virtual world like the <u>Reblooming</u> <u>Iris page on Facebook</u>, you know that a common question is "how can I tell if an iris is technically a rebloomer?" Sometimes irises bloom in the summer, sometimes in the fall, but not the following spring, and so on, hence the question.

Some people are really fussy about their rebloomers and insist that they follow strict rules. For those, we have the definition from The World of Irises written by members of The American Iris Society, edited by Bee Warburton with Melba Hamblen as Assistant Editor, and with help from Dr. Raymond Smith. Dr. Smith wrote that "a rebloomer may be defined as any iris that produces an extra period of full bloom each year. By full bloom is meant bloom of one or more increases from each rhizome that flowered during the immediately preceding regular period. This definition excludes those sorts whose stalks emerge serially over an extended season, as well as clones with only a fraction of the mature rhizomes blooming during one period and the remainder during the next, even though such sorts do provide color apart from regular seasons and are frequently misla-

beled rebloomers" (Warburton: 137).

The AIS Judges Handbook is a bit more "loose." In summary, it states that rebloom should produce enough additional bloomstalks to double the total number of days of bloom produced annually (143).



'Earl of Essex'

1. Rebloomers (Cyclic Rebloomers), the standard for this group, are cultivars which complete two distinct cycles of bloom. After the spring flowering, there is a second nearly predictable period of bloom.

2. Multiple Blooming Irises send up bloomstalks repeatedly at any time throughout the growing season, spring to summer and fall.

3. Repeaters produce additional bloomstalks with unpredictable regularity immediately following or shortly thereafter the initial Spring bloom season. It is not uncommon for these varieties to extend the spring bloom season from four to eight weeks.

4. Sporadic Rebloomers are varieties which unpredictably produce bloomstalks at varying times during the growing season. Many occasional rebloomers perform well on the West coast and the Southern areas of the United States. While they are highly regarded there, they may not show reblooming tendencies in

colder climates.

5. Secondary Stalk Rebloomers, although rare, occur when rhizomes send up secondary stalks in the same growing season.

I must admit, I have a loose definition: I like iris blooms so much that I welcome just about anything that puts up an extra bloom stalk.

My hybridizing lines were originally started with 'Feed Back', 'Early of Essex', 'Immortality', and a few others that rebloomed in fall.
