

2017 Region 17 Meeting

I hope many of you will plan to attend the annual Region 17 Meeting August 4-5. This year we will be celebrating the 70th anniversary of Region 17. The meeting hotel will



be the Courtyard by Marriott Dallas Northwest, 2930 Forest Lane, Dallas. The deadline to receive the group rate of \$75 per night + taxes for the hotel is July 21st. The

meeting registration fee is \$60 if paid by <u>July 25</u> and will go up \$10 if paid after that deadline. The registration fee includes Friday and Saturday evening meals, Saturday breakfast and lunch and hospitality room wine and hor d'oeuvres. If you would like to attend the Judges Training, it will be an additional \$10.

Saturday will be Judges Training in the morning: What Would You Do? - 1 hour Ethics and 2 hours TB garden and exhibition judging, the Regional business meeting, and the ever popular IRIS AUCTION, followed by the banquet and program - Sex in the Garden...a Dauber's Guide to Hybridizing. Our guest

speaker and judges training instructor will be Cheryl Deaton of Canyon Country, CA., hybridizer and AIS Youth Chair. There will be a Silent Auction.

All events will take place at Holy Cross Lutheran Church, a very short 1.5 mile drive from the hotel, at 11425 Marsh Lane. Transportation will be available for those without a car.

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Rebloomers (cont.)

al iris rebloom this summer. This can be attributed to more than average rainfall the past few months. Whatever the reason, we are enjoying iris bloom when we don't usually have any. If you have irises bloom, please write down the date and the names of the irises and send this information to our Southern Area Director for the Reblooming Gailmae Iris Society, Suite. metex65@yahoo.com, or you can send them to me and I will pass them on to Gailmae.

I recently received a newsletter from Jim Hedgecock of **Comanche Acres Iris Garden** in Missouri. He had a very interesting article on how to grow reblooming irises. Here is what he had to say:

"If you do not give reblooming irises extra fertilizer and water through the summer months, you probably won't get rebloom. Reblooming irises produce 2 sets of rhizomes a year. One for the spring, and one for the summer or fall months. With this in mind, you need to give them extra fertilizer. We fertilize all irises in the spring and fall. Here in the Midwest we fertilize in March and October. If you want rebloom a third application should be about 45 to 60 days after spring bloom. The other factor is water. If the plants are to make 2 sets of rhizomes they need extra water through all summer months. You don't need to water every day, just be sure that the soil does not dry to a hard baked condition. One other caution, regular once blooming irises

should not be watered or fertilized in the summer on a regular basis. So with this in mind, do not plant your once blooming irises with the rebloomers. Watering regular irises in summer will often cause rot."

Jim continues, "Even if you have completed every suggestion I have made, they may not rebloom every year. Reblooming irises sometimes just don't produce fall bloom. If you do the extra things I have suggested they will rebloom on a regular basis, but maybe not every year."
