#### Glenn has been growing irises for over 20 years and currently maintains an extensive planting of tall bearded irises. He says, "the challenge to growing irises is complicated when the grower is uncertain regarding the importance of the recommended cultural practices. Understanding the correct cultural practices is the key to success with irises."

# January 18, 2020 Club Minutes by Bill Calhoon, Secretary

Held at Crestview Church of Christ Community Center

Club President Dan Cathey called the meeting to order at 10:12 am, welcomed members and introduced new members Adair and Jameson McGregor.

Secretary Bill Calhoon conducted Roll Call. Thirteen (13) members were present at the meeting. Minutes of the November 2019 meeting had been printed in the WIS newsletter. After receiving no additions or corrections from the floor, the minutes were accepted as published.

Treasurer Mitchell Whitley presented the Treasurer's Report. The balance of the Club account as of December 12, 2019, was \$9,872.87. After no additions or corrections from the floor, the Treasurer's Report was accepted as presented.

Dan reported a new shipment of plant markers had been received. New price for WIS members is \$9 per bundle of 25 markers.

The slate of officers for the 2020-2021 club year was presented. Mitchell Whitley and Michael Lowe served as the Nominating Committee.

Ken Anderson noted that he will be listed as "Show Chair" to sign off on the Iris Show paperwork. Peggy Cathey noted that in order to retain AIS affiliation, the offices of President, Treasurer and Recording Secretary are required to be filled and that the officers be members of AIS.

Show Co-Chair Ken Anderson reviewed the list of various Show Committee assignments and confirmed volunteers for the roles. Ken will complete and submit the Show Schedule for final AIS approval.

Dan reviewed the WIS By-Laws regarding officers, reading the descriptions of the roles of President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. Dan also reviewed the election process: January – Slate of Officers presented; March – Vote on Slate of Officers presented at the January meeting; May – new Officers installed to begin roles at the September meeting.

Bill conducted AIS membership drawings: winner for November 2019 was Preston Floyd; winner for January 2020 was new member Jameson McGregor.

Preston Floyd asked for suggestions regarding the location of the Year-End Luncheon. Following discussion of various locations and options, there was consensus that Ocean Buffet was first choice.

Dan recognized the passing of Roger Duncan, iris hybridizer and partner of Rick Tasco at Superstition Iris Garden. For several years WIS has ordered from Superstition for the annual Giveaway and Auction.

In New Business, WIS has been asked to consider a contribution to the hosts of the 2020 Region 17 Meeting which is to be hosted by the Iris Society of Dallas. Preston Floyd moved that the Waco Iris Society contribute \$100 to the Iris Society of Dallas for costs associated with hosting the annual Region 17 meeting; Peggy Cathey seconded; the motion carried. [The 2020 Region 17 Meeting is to be held July 31-August 1, 2020, at Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Dallas. Guest Speaker will be Gary White.]

Ken announced that the 2020 WIS show theme is "Texas Celebrates the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of AIS" and distributed copies of the Artistic Design Categories. There was discussion of the categories and explanation of the "novice" category.

Mitchell Whitley commented that he has already noticed snails. Dan shared that Hi Yield snail bait is effective.

A recap of Glenn Huddleston's recent presentation to the Johnson County Iris & Daylily Society was shared. Since the fertilizer needs moisture to be activated, it's important to provide supplemental water if we don't get rainfall. Breakdown usually takes about 30 days. A "balanced" fertilizer (all 3 numbers the same/similar) is preferred.

In follow-up on the Iris Show, it was noted that visitation usually drops off by 3:00 pm. Following discussion regarding pros and cons of ending the show earlier, Preston Floyd moved to change the closing time from 4:00 pm to 3:00 pm; Jerry Keith seconded; motion carried.

Following a break for refreshments, Peggy Cathey presented a program on "Stalking the Queen of Show."
