The Many Color Patterns of Iris

This month, we will learn all about the many color patterns of irises and what each of these patterns is called. Peggy Cathey will be our speaker. Hopefully, by the end of the program you will know the difference



Still Some Winter Chill by Ken Anderson, Show Chair

It is that time of year again when gardeners are anticipating spring. We are still experiencing some chilling weather, but there are signs that this will be over very soon. The only thing blooming in my garden right now are daffodils and a few grape hyacinths. As usual, we are at that time of year when we look at our irises and wonder if we will even have one bloom stalk. It seems so hard to remember from one year to the next that regardless of how bad our plants look in January and February, there will always be a garden full of color by April. Our spring show is just a month away, and it seems those plants need to get busy if they are going to produce blooms in time for the show. But as I recall, that is pretty typical of the way we think and fairly typical of how the irises perform. Fortunately, our coldest freezing weather was not nearly as extreme as last year. Several members grow some or all of their irises in containers. I hope that the cold weather did not wipe out your plants as it did last year. I have many irises growing in pots, and it seems that they have weathered the cold temperatures much better this year. At least as I walked through my yard, making observations here and there, I did not see any rhizomes that were negatively impacted by the cold weather. Many of the irises growing in the ground are beginning to send up new growth. I am anticipating a good year. Although we have needed some rain, we certainly have had enough chilling time!

Our show schedule has been approved, and we are nearing the time of final preparations for our spring show. At our March meeting, usual reminders and information will be provided for all members who in-

tend to have entries. New members are encouraged to bring entries. If you need help or have questions about what needs to be done, there are many club members who will be happy to assist you and answer questions. This is an excellent time to note any questions you have about the show, as a portion of the March meeting is always devoted to show preparation.

I want to remind everyone that we need to have members sign up for the artistic division of the show. A sign-up sheet will be available at the meeting with information available to suggest ideas for each class of displays. Our theme is *Seasons of Color*. Class 1 is *Winter Wonderland*. Class 2 is *Spring Has Sprung*. Class 3 is *Sizzling Summer* (Novice). Class 4 is *Fall Festivities*. Class 3 is reserved for anyone entering who has not won a blue ribbon in the Artistic Division.
