Neva Sexton was the only American woman to have won 2 Dykes Medals; PACIFIC PANORAMA, ruffled sea blue, in 1965 and NEW MOON, yellow, in 1973.

She was born in 1906; raised on an Arkadelphia, Arkansas farm. She grew up with a special feeling for the soil and all plants and animals.

She married at sixteen, and soon afterward left with 3 small children to care for and raise, she moved to her grandfather's farm.

To try and make a better life for herself and her children, she decided to move to California. She eventually settled in Wasco. There she met a transplanted Texan named Harvey Sexton and they were married.

Neva always did love flowers and was enchanted with the IRISES she saw at the Bakersfield spring flower show in 1952. Charlie Salzer invited her to see his garden. Neva quickly decided that she would grow IRISES, and grow the best, making them even better by hybridizing them. She "chopped cotton "- hoed weeds in the cotton fields - for \$1.00 an hour in order to purchase what she wanted. It took 20 hours of work to earn money for the \$20 Limelight, and 30 hours for Toast An' Honey.

In the span from 1959 to 1983 she registered 56 irises: 54 of these were introduced and 41 of the 54 were voted HONORABLE MENTION by A I S Judges. Seven of the 41 went on to win AWARDS OF MERIT. And of course 2 won the DYKES MEDAL. In 1973 the A I S BOARD OF DIRECTORS chose to

honor her by awarding her the coveted HYBRIDIZER'S MEDAL.

Neva began putting out a small list of irises and introduced her own irises after 1960.

Her iris activities soon outgrew her small home garden, and she purchased 2 city lots so the iris plant ings could expand. She was proud that she had been able to pay for the lots with money saved from the sale of irises she had bred.

Neva worked with her beloved iris, even the in poor health, up to one year before her death in 1985.



HOW TO PHOTOGRAPH

I tried writing an article about this and somehow I finally decided that I didn't know what I was talking about. So the only advice that I can give at this time is to read your manual that came with your camera. Get a good quality tripod (one that is sturdy) if you are planning on taking close up shots of your iris . Some type of close-up lens would also be needed . I would imagine that someone working at a camera shop would be the best source of information as to one for your specific camera . As I have said in past flyers - it sure is nice to have a "photo " record of our beautiful iris. So if you do not already take pictures of your iris - give it a try this year.

POLLEN

The best way to make sure the pollen you plan to use is usable, is to take the bud into the house the evening before you want to collect it and let the bud open in the house.

Dry pollen can be used for several days if kept in an envelope. If kept dry in the refrigerator, it will keep for several weeks and frozen dry, for a year.

Pollen is ruined when it gets wet. It explodes each grain.

Pollen can be stored in gelatin capsules bought from the druggist. Buy capsules small enough to hold one anther. The capsules can be placed in a jar with a tight fitting lid. Add some silica gel to keep the air dry. Print the name of the pollen parent on the capsule and place sealed jar in the freezer. This way you only need remove the capsule that you are going to

use for hybridizing and the rest of the pollen will stay usable for as long as you need it.
